

The campaign focuses on the following objectives:

- Aggressively attacking incurred debt
- Building two additional classrooms on the 12th Street campus
- Building a gymnasium on the 12th Street campus
- Providing a new roof over the 500 wing on the Stadium Drive campus
- Replacing all classroom furniture at the Stadium Drive campus
- Building the 1877 Society of the Kalamazoo Christian School Foundation
- Protecting the schools' annual fund for the next three years

The campaign totals roughly 6 million dollars (according to preliminary cost predictions). To date, we have raised 2.88 million in gifts and commitments - praise God! There is much work ahead, but we know we serve a good Father with immeasurable capabilities. SPANISH AUTHORS

For the second year in a row, students from Kalamazoo Christian Middle School have been recognized for their writing through the Write Michigan Short Story Contest. The semifinalists from Kalamazoo Christian were 6th graders Samantha Huffstetler, Conley Kakabeeke, and Jacob VanDyk. All three students participate in the Spanish Immersion program and submitted their short stories in the Spanish language category.

In November, students independently submitted short stories and were selected as semifinalists in January. Voting was open to the public for 20 days and the finalists were announced on February 5, 2017. Samantha Huffstetler's short story *El Diario de Valentina Valeria* was selected and recognized as a Published Finalist. The top 5 stories in each category (Adult, Teen, Youth, and Spanish-Language) will be published and available in March 2018.

Samantha Huffstetler's story, *El Diario de Valentina Valeria*, is about



a 13 year old girl that immigrated without her parents to the United States from Guatemala. The young character moves in with a large family and experiences hardships of fitting in and acclimating to a new life in America. The short story is written as diary entries which was inspired from previous books that the young author has enjoyed. At the end of the story the author flashes forward to a later timeline where her daughter finds her diary and reads the entries of her mom at a young age adjusting to life as an immigrant.

Conley Kakabeeke's story, *Adiós Puerto Rico*, is about a young girl forced to leave her home in Puerto Rico due to the devastation of

Hurricane Maria. She travels with a friend and her older brother by boat to Florida and then by train to Michigan. They move in with a family of two Spanish teachers that help her learn English and adjust to their new surroundings.

Jacob VanDyk's story, *Juan de Honduras*, is about a boy who immigrated from Honduras to New York to Detroit. This character goes through many ups and downs in the short story as he deals with leaving his home country, moving away from grandparents, learning a new language, and adjusting to life in a new and foreign country. Eventually the character makes friends in his new home and adjusts to a new life in America.

All three young authors were proud of their short stories and recognition for being selected as semi-finalists in the Spanish language category. Their entries went up against an all ages group of native and non-native speakers. Congratulations to the participants and winner of the 6th Annual Write Michigan Short Story Contest!



COMET BOOSTER HALL OF FAME

The Comet Booster Club recently inducted four former athletes from Kalamazoo Christian High School into the Athletic Hall of Fame.



The first inductee, Doug Jager, is a 1976 graduate who earned nine varsity letters in cross country, basketball, and track. Doug was a three time conference champion in

cross country and held the KCHS cross country course record his senior year. After graduating from KCHS, Doug continued his running career at Calvin College, and he coached for 26 years at Grand Rapids Christian High School. In addition, Doug has been a six time recipient of the Michigan Track Coaches Association coach of the year award.



Our second inductee is Jerry Mastenbrook, a 1978 graduate who earned four varsity letters in basketball and baseball. As a senior, Jerry was named all-KVA, all-city and 4th team all-

state in basketball. After graduating from KCHS, Jerry played four years of varsity basketball at Calvin College. After college, Jerry began teaching and coaching at Kalamazoo Christian Middle School where he coached MS basketball for 18 years and HS basketball at Kalamazoo Christian for 17 years. Jerry was named the Michigan

AP coach of the year in after his team won the state championship in 2008.

The next two awards were given posthumously to the families in honor of two of our inductees who have passed away.



Ric Vlietstra was a 1969 graduate of KCHS and in 1968 he scored the first ever goal for a Comet soccer team. After high school he played soccer

at WMU. Beginning in the mid-1970s, Ric served multiple terms on the Comet Booster Club, including a term as president. He also served as chairman for the annual Booster Club golf outing for twenty years. In addition, Ric served as the public address announcer for Kalamazoo Christian men's basketball for forty years. Ric was truly the voice of Comet basketball.



Ken Durian was a 1968 graduate of KCHS. He earned four varsity letters in baseball and basketball and was named all-conference and all-city in baseball. As an alumni,

Ken was a Booster Club member and our basketball and football concessions coordinator for 23 years. He was also a volunteer softball coach from 1995-2004 where he had a significant role in Kalamazoo Christian's six state championship softball teams during that time.

THINK BIG SERIES: GRETCHEN CARLSON

When the Think Big Committee considered Gretchen Carlson to be our next speaker, they could not have known how her national influence as a voice for sexual harassment would impact our November 9, 2017 dinner. Less than 48 hours before she arrived in Kalamazoo, they were asked to provide space at the Kalamazoo Country Club for a CNN live broadcast just minutes after she finished speaking. Gretchen was the featured guest on a town hall called Tipping Point: Sexual Harassment in America. Many were talking about how Gretchen had paved the way for women to speak up even after years of silence.



TV, and that began her broadcasting career spanning 26 years until leaving Fox News in 2016.

The sexual harassment lawsuit Gretchen filed against Fox News Chairman & CEO Roger Ailes was the most trying and isolating time of her life. For encouragement, she taped verses from Isaiah 41:10 and Psalms 27:1 on the front of her datebook to read each day. Gretchen's latest book, *Be Fierce*, follows her path of faith and what to do when faced with sexual harassment. Her bi-partisan work

appearing before Congress to lobby changes to arbitration clauses has affected real change in the work place.

The next day, Gretchen spoke to the Kalamazoo Christian high schoolers at chapel where she encouraged them to speak up about their faith. She also spoke about how we all are affected by sexual harassment. "It's not just an issue for girls to know what to do. Men of faith should also be ready to speak up when they witness abuse."

We are very thankful to our faithful donors who helped us raise \$88,000 that will go toward funding the Samaritan Fund for the next two school years which will assist families with emergency needs in meeting their tuition obligations.

Growing up in Anoka, MN, Gretchen formed her faith from the influence of her grandfather, a Lutheran pastor, and her parents. Discovering a talent for the violin at seven years old, Gretchen's mother advised her "that God gave you many talents and He expects you to make the most of them." And that's what she did. At 13, she performed as a soloist with the Minnesota Symphony, at 15 she traveled to Kalamazoo to compete in the Stulberg Competition, at 17 she graduated as valedictorian of her high school class, and at 22 she was crowned Miss America.


Gretchen's jump from music to broadcasting came about from a practical joke. As the new Miss America, she was invited on a news program to introduce a segment about which she'd received no briefing. It turned out to be a set-up for a prank on TV's Bloopers and Practical Jokes. When the cameras went live, her hosts walked out, forcing her to ad lib for 15 minutes! Her poise earned her calls from agents who saw a natural talent to handle anything on live

2018 TAX LAW CHANGES: 529 PLANS

While all of the changes are still being evaluated, one change to the tax law in 2018 is that 529 Accounts can be used to fund private education (Grades K-12) in addition to college expenses.

What it means to you: 529 account contributions can be funded by parents, grandparents, or anyone else. The after tax contributions can grow tax free over time. Eligible expenses can now be used to fund private



education as well as college education. Michigan state tax law allows up to a \$10,000

deduction for increased 529 investments. Gift taxes may apply. Please see your financial advisor for applications of your specific scenario.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT *roger linders*
